Dear Reader

I regard myself as being very fortunate to be having piano lessons. Being a student of mature years, it is possible that I am rather more aware than a young person might be, of my weak points. I suggested to my teacher that she might save a lot of time spent on writing comments on manuscripts that we are working through if she had a set of those old fashioned rubber stamps engraved with certain words; say three or four of them, and an ink pad; to deal with the points I most frequently fail to observe. She tells me to be like a detective, with a view to discovering how the music fits together in all its fullness and of course to listen to how my playing matches up to what is there is front of me on the page.

In short, I am urged to be attentive.


I venture to suggest that anyone who has spent time with Rev. Jonathan will have heard a similar urging to be attentive; not in terms of a music manuscript or in listening to music on a disc or streamed, but rather to be attentive to God's 'music' -although he doesn't quite put it that way. He speaks in terms of perceiving God's presence in the quiet and in being still. To be open to God's prompting.

Let me quote from the second part of R.S. Thomas' poem 'The Bright Field'.

*...Life is not hurrying
on to a receding future, nor hankering after
an imagined past. It is the turning
aside like Moses to the miracle
of the lit bush, to a brightness
that seemed as transitory as your youth
once, but is the eternity that awaits you.*

Christmas and perhaps to a lesser extent Epiphany, can hit us and the world around us with such 'in your face' force, that 'turning aside like Moses' might seem to be an impossible ask. But try digging more gently and deeper into the Christmas and Epiphany stories this year, looking for those messages which even after all these years may have eluded you in the past. Where might that bright star be leading you?

What is Christian Meditation ?


Christian meditation is a way to go more deeply into praying and living. Highs and lows are part of living. Discovering the depth of living gives us something else, that is stabilising.

This is because meditation provides a break from the dramas of living, a pause in stillness and silence. In this pause, all 'the stuff' of living can settle, like the sediment in a bottle of beer or wine. Then the goodness can be seen and tasted afresh.

The Autumn Season of Christian Meditation is an opportunity for you to taste this for yourself. In addition, a simple method is described that provides a float for you to hold on to, as you enter the stillness and silence. Afterwards, there is an opportunity to ask questions and share experiences and discoveries.

But as I write this, the thoughtful season of advent has not even begun – the time when we God-Botherers ponder how much we need a Saviour – so I don't want to ho ho ho at you just yet. I do hope that despite the chill in the air caused by national and global events you will avail yourselves when the time comes of all the hope and joy that your local church and community can muster.

Advent is about looking at ourselves and at the world and realising just how much we need a Saviour. Christmas would be pointless if we didn't - just a marketing ploy cooked up by sellers of toys, perfumes and frozen party nibbles to get us all to spend as much money as possible. Let's face it, if a fire engine screeched to a halt outside your house with sirens blaring and blue lights flashing you might wonder what it was doing there if your house was not on fire. You might be mildly interested but you would hardly celebrate your salvation! In the same way the baby whose birth we celebrate on Christmas Day and who we hail as Saviour is similarly baffling and underwhelming if you cannot see anything that we need saving from!

Sometimes it seems easier to believe in evil than in God. But if you do believe that evil exists – if you see it in all its brutality in our daily news, if it touches you in grief, fear, loneliness, hatred, jealousy- then you may dimly begin to understand why we need our Saviour. If you look at the impact on individuals of national, international and corporate greed then you may begin to understand why we need our Saviour. If you look at the wars devastating communities across the globe you will understand why we need our Saviour. If you dare to look into the devices and desires of your own heart you may begin to ruefully understand why you need a Saviour.

Perhaps deep inside we all vaguely sense the need for a Saviour because we can all see what is wrong. It is only a step- a stride admittedly- from faintly sensing the need for a Saviour to considering that salvation might come from God and not human endeavour and then another step again to truly recognizing Him from the Christmas story repeated every year for 2 millennia by those persistent folk in the churches and deliciously enacted by our tiny children with tea towels on their heads.

Saint of the Month: Ambrose

Dec 7

Imagine you are the Governor of a whole province. Things are going well: so well that one day you attend the election of a new bishop for Milan, and find that – by popular acclamation – it's going to be you, even though you are not yet even baptised (although a Christian), let alone ordained.

That's what happened to Ambrose (c339-397). He turned out to be just as effective as a Bishop as he was a Governor, and indeed a first-rate theologian too, becoming seen as one of the four great Doctors (Teachers) of the Church. And if Hugh of Lincoln was ready to take on a king, Ambrose took on Emperors, and often won.

So – whatever you are doing these days, watch out! God may have other plans for you...

NEWS FROM THE CATHEDRAL

Peter Dyke's annual **Christmas Sparkle organ concert** will launch Hereford Cathedral's season of festive music on Saturday 29 November, 1.15 pm.

Preparations for Hereford Cathedral's annual **Christmas Fair** are well underway with over forty stallholders attending the event on **Saturday 13 December**.

Opening at 9.30am, the cathedral will be filled with stallholders selling a range of *festive gifts* including jewellery, artwork and homeware. There will also be a selection of *food and drink* on offer to browse including locally produced chocolates, wine and cordials. The Cathedral Gardeners will be there with their incredibly popular *plant stall* and the Cathedral Café and Shop stall will be selling some special *foodie gifts* alongside their normal offering.

The *Cathedral Café* will be open with an additional stall in the nave serving mulled wine, spiced cider and festive treats. At 12 noon, everyone is welcome to wrap up warm and join in the festive fun as *carol singing*, led by the Dean, will take place in the Cathedral Close



Harvest at Holy Trinity 2025

A big thank you to everyone throughout the Team who contributed to our Harvest giving at Holy Trinity. All the goods are now in the store at Monkmoor Street and are available to be used when required.

Hereford Foodbank exists to support people during difficult times by providing 7- day emergency parcels. There are some common misconceptions about how the system works. Hopefully the information below will give readers a more accurate understanding of its function.

Myth: People can just turn up and get food.

Reality: We operate using a referral system. People need to be referred by professionals such as social worker, GP's, or schools who assess individual needs. This ensures support goes out to those who genuinely need it.

Myth: People become dependent on foodbanks.

Reality: Our food parcels are designed to provide short – term emergency support, not regular groceries. For longer term help, we encourage people to use Community Larders or Foodshares in the city. These projects are open to everyone, reduce food waste by redistributing supermarket surplus, and provide free or low – cost food to help stretched household budgets.

Myth: Only people who are unemployed can get a referral to the foodbank.

Reality: We can provide an emergency parcel to anyone in crisis, if they have a professional referral – whether they are in work or not.

Myth: Foodbanks get all their food from supermarkets for free.

Reality: While donations and supermarket collections help, we also purchase a significant amount of food to meet demand and ensure parcels are balanced and nutritious.

Myth: People abuse the system.

Reality: On average, people use the foodbank just twice. We do our best to make sure recipients get the right support, so they don't have to rely on us again.


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CHRISTMAS FAIR

The Whitecross Chronicles No: 28

The growth and development of west Hereford along the Whitecross Road, with a Railway station, cider works and plenty of housing eventually led to a decision to build a church in 1885 and make a parish in 1902. The site upon which the church was built was given by the Custos and Vicars of the Cathedral, together with land sufficient for a Vicarage' (Norman Owen, 'Holy Trinity Hereford' p4). The west side of Hereford sandwiched between Holmer and Westfaling Street fell within the parish of All Saints and it had been All Saints parish which originally erected the Iron Room in 1879 on Whitecross Road to provide Christian worship and a community meeting place. Frank Woods was the vicar of All Saints and in the days when parishes had curates, Norman Campbell was the curate in charge of the Whitecross Road district, when the building was proposed in 1882 (see Norman Owen p2)



Do read the description of the opening service and consecration in Norman Owen's book, on May 28th 1885. At first the church was part of All Saint's parish under the direction of the vicar of All Saints with at first curates in charge from 1885 and later priests in charge from 1889. It was not until 1902 that Holy Trinity became a parish and broke away from the mother church of All Saints with a parish carved out of four old parishes; All Saints, St Nicholas, Holmer and St John the Baptist, with Edmund Charles Poulter being the first vicar in 1902.

The architect chosen was a local architect, Frederick Robertson Kempson (1838-1923) who was born at Birchfields, Bromyard, the son of Revd William Brooke Kempson, JP, who was rector of Stoke Lacey 1839-59. From 1861 Frederick had his practice at 18, St Owen Street, from where he did some of the building work at Stoke Lacey from 1863 and St Michael's Breinton in 1866. Later he eventually worked for Sir James Rankin at Bryngwyn, Wormelow (1868), after which, he was recommended by Sir James to design the Hereford Library and Museum in Broad Street (1872-4). Meanwhile he had secured the job for designing St Paul's Tupsley, 'one of his best early buildings' (Jean O'Donnell, 'The Hereford Free Library' Woolhope Transactions), where he was married in November 1865, soon after the church was completed and he later became churchwarden. His daughter Rachel (an actress) married Michael Redgrave 'and became the mother of the Redgrave acting clan' (Philip Weaver, 'A Dictionary of Herefordshire Biography')

It was later in Frederick's career that he designed Holy Trinity of which the nave was built in 1883-5. The church building was designed to be built in sections, when money was available, which explains why the chancel was built later in 1905-6 and the south-east tower and spire was never built. It is not thought to be an inspired design famously described by Henry Stuart Goodhart Rendel, 'the dullest church he had ever seen' (Philip Weaver). Pevsner describes the building as, 'Early English style, large, uniform ... its best feature the north bellcote, between two chimneys'. Having helped toll the bell for the late Queen Elizabeth's funeral, the bell still rings, but perhaps I should take more notice of the bellcote!

I think it must be a mixed blessing being an architect for you have to take criticism. Frederick Kempson was greatly influenced by Ruskin, Pugin and William Morris while articled for the firm Seddon and Pritchard in Cardiff and London. The 1850 Oxford Museum, incorporating design ideas by Ruskin with amazing skilled carving of flora and fauna on the outside, must have influenced the exterior design of our library and museum on Broad Street. St Paul's Tupsley also has a decorated brick interior and exterior, while the exterior of the old County College for Boys on Aylestone Hill (1880) with patterned brick work is also well thought of. Holy Trinity is built from local stone quarried from Fayre Oakes and not brick like the church at Tupsley. I guess that today we can applaud the building as being eco-friendly in being built of local stone and being possibly an economic decision to source materials locally. I have been told to look at the drawing Kempson did of the completed church and indeed the finished building is well balanced and would make a delightful scene on Whitecross Road. But the residents and church goers of Whitecross then as now are not that well off and so the building has never been completed.

Norman Owen describes the nave and aisles, 'as copies of the church at Madley'. It is no bad thing to worship God in a building which looks from the outside to be a large Victorian barn, built from stone quarried locally and perhaps inspired by the building of a local village church. Nowadays with such a large nave, and heating problems with the boilers which are costly to run and occasionally break down, we can ill afford to have the warmth we are accustomed to at home. However, the sound of the music by the choir and organ, in a building which has a good acoustic is amazing, and in the end, the worship and the people make the church not the building!



New Beginnings and Honest Hopes

These days, New Year's Eve arrives with a bang — fireworks in the sky, fizz in the glass, and countdowns echoing across screens and city squares. There's celebration, noise, and the shared thrill of turning the page.

A few years ago, a friend of mine visited someone in their parish just after New Year. She was in her eighties, lived alone, and had no interest in resolutions. But she had a tradition: every January, she would take down the old calendar, hang up the new one, and write one word in the corner of the first page — a word to carry with her through the year.

That year, the word was *kindness*.

Not a goal, not a challenge. Just a quiet intention. A reminder to herself, and to anyone who happened to notice it on the wall.

She said, "I don't always manage it. But it helps me begin again when I forget."

I think about that often.

Not the fireworks, but the handwritten word.


Not the pressure, but the grace.

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


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SUPPORT FOR EDUCATION

Hospitality in the Midst of Winter

December draws its breath in the hush between frost and firelight. The days shorten, the air sharpens, and we find ourselves reaching for warmth — not just in scarves and stews, but in one another.

This season, more than most, invites us to practise hospitality. Not the polished kind with matching napkins and perfect timing, but the deeper kind: the open door, the extra chair, the quiet presence that says, *you matter*.


"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some have entertained angels unawares."

St Michael's Musings 20

Now then! I wonder whether I can set you a problem concerning travel in 1910? It will be Christmas and it will be lovely to go to Egypt and see the pyramids but how would **you** get there? A visit to Cooks the travel agents would help decide whether to travel over land or by sea. We are a nation with an empire that loves travelling and trading by sea with our colonies and there are many ships travelling via the Mediterranean and Suez Canal to India and beyond. So, E. A. Binstead, the brother of Charles Binstead Vicar of Breinton, decided to travel by cargo ship, starting from Liverpool to Suez then across country to Cairo. I enjoyed reading his diary in HARC and so I shall give you a few entries up to New Year's Day (E.A. Binstead Travel Diary B283/6/2).



"Left Euston at 12.10pm on Thursday the 22nd Dec 1910 - for Birkenhead - a long train & very crowded. Got there by 5 o'clock & was soon in a cab with another passenger - bound for the docks - and the S.S. "Ava". P Henderson and Co's fine steamer outward bound for Rangoon & C. I am booked through to Suez or Port Said ... This is a fine strong ship of 7480 tons built by Denny of Dunbarton in 1906. 410 feet long by 52 ft beam. Cabins all amidships, well fit up with all the latest. Captain Mitchell and all the officers & crew with the exception of the coolies - all seem to come from Glasgow where the ship belongs. We have about 22 passengers including 3 or 4 ladies & 2 children, a nurse and 2 cats!"

"Sunday Xmas day I was awoke by the steward coming into my cabin at 6.30 with tea & toast and an apple - which they do every morning at this early hour. He's a Scotchman with an accent - saying- "The complements of the season to yr 'Sir" and a Happy Christmas". That over I had my tea & toast & then took another snooze! Breakfast at 9 o'clock, lunch at 1, tea 4, dinner 7. We are only doing about 8 and half knots. At noon each day they put up on a map the position of the ship marking it with a pin. We are today just about the centre of the Bay of Biscay - strong wind & moderate sea - still many absent places owing to the wish of the sick ones to do a little fish feeding! Tho' this ship is very steady & has a big cargo & really rolls very little to what many ships would be in this mean sea."

"Wednesday 28th. Smooth sea. We passed Gib at 3.15am. One or two passengers and the doctor got up to see the rock & only saw a row of lights - lively weather we are now in spring again. the Mediterranean is beautiful, had a splendid view of the Sierra Nevada mountains in Spain - all snowcapped & rich in colour. The Coolies busy cleaning the white awnings and commenced putting them up on the bridge deck. Barr the chief Engineer hailing from Dumbarton tells me the ship is burning 35 tons of coal a day & that they carry enough to take them to Rangoon & back to Suez or Algiers without coaling. He tells me the ship pays about £1300 dues for going thro' the canal - & each passenger 10 Francs. My fare works out at 1d per mile from L.pool to Suez - £14. 0. 0. This is the best day's run so far - 295 miles, as last Saturday she only did 200 miles in 24 hours. Two young Americans going out to Burma to the oilfields - they came over on the 'Cedrick' from N Y this month. One said he, 'got fairly done with nothin' to do. I guess that when I get back to the States in 3 years time I'll be as soft as a sponge.' This afternoon big clouds came up from the N.E. & we are in half a gale now. The awnings were soon taken in & we had plenty of water flying over us & cold strong wind - & stormy sunset & glass going down"

"Saturday Dec 31st 1910 Passed Cape Bon at 9 o'clock this morning - a wild looking coast - sea much calmer & wind aft - but still the fag end of the gale. Only a few empty seats at breakfast. The chief told me he had never known a gale last so long in the Mediterranean. Yesterday we passed one of the troop ships no.2 painted white with a yellow funnel bound home taking huge seas right over her - even up to the crows nest - tho' she was close to, no one could be seen on board. During the night the fog horn was going several times as we passed thro' several heavy rain storms, & up to 11 o'clock when I turned in it was as dark as pitch not a star to be seen. Run 262 miles at noon. Passed close to Pantelleria & signalled them at 12.30 a big sea breaking on the rocks. Heavy storm all evening with thunder & lightening & very dark. We saw the light on Gozo - Malta- at 10.30. This being the last night of the old year we had a concert till 11 o'clock when the lights are put out but nearly everyone remained about the deck till 8 bells - midnight - & then general hand shaking all round & amongst our Scotch young men going out to Burma - the whisky was on tap - & some of them had a "night we Burns" !"

This is just a taster from the beginning of his diary and so descriptive of the journey! I suggest you go and have a look at it in HARC and another diary he wrote. It is disappointing when he gets to Cairo as he had not the same time available to write up his experiences, but as far as travelling there and back, it is full of insights into travel in 1910.

I wish you all safe travel and a Happy Christmas and New Year!


